Long-Term Planning and Innovation

Living a life of significance is not merely measured by what you possess, but rather by the size of the problem you can solve. Through constant innovation and long-term visioning, we overcame the past year determined to light the way for Marian Girls.

Through the completion of our \$5 million Capital Campaign, *Transforming Lives and Building for Our Future*, we improved the life and learning environment of our 80+ year old building. We improved energy efficiency, electrical systems, and our emergency alert system, and added new HVAC, which significantly improved building ventilation, in addition to other vital upgrades. We also created long-term sustainability for our Graduate Support Program by establishing a \$2.5 million reserve to support this unique part of our educational model.

We have used this time to create a 10-Year Impact Statement to accelerate our ability to break the cycle of poverty through education. Education is one of the strongest predictors of success, and Marian is accelerating and deepening our impact through three primary focus areas:

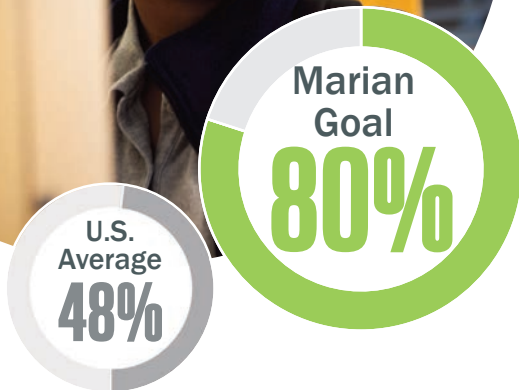
- Enhancing our **Graduate Support Program** for Marian alumnae
- Establishing **wrap around support services** for Marian students, alumnae, and families
- Evaluating the expansion into **elementary education** to lay a stronger foundation for Marian Girls

In order to help Marian Girls and their families break the cycle of poverty, by 2030 80% of Marian students will complete post-secondary education (compared to the national average of only 48%).

We have a steadfast belief that the cycle of poverty can end through a sustainable career and quality education that starts when girls are young. Together we are building the economy of tomorrow.

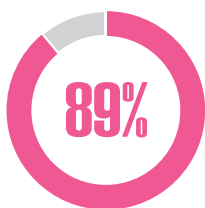

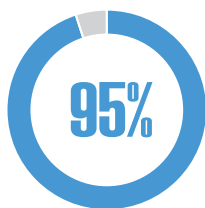
OUR MISSION

A Letter from Our Graduate

The Right Choice for Success

One day, my mom told me she was thinking of enrolling me in a new school. She wanted to ensure I had everything I needed to succeed and she made the right choice!

When my mother enrolled me at Marian, I had no idea how great my potential was. Previously, I had trouble focusing and I struggled academically. But by the end of my first year at Marian, I was excelling in my coursework and soon, mastering high school curriculum.

Marian's support system has empowered me in so many ways, like providing me with the tools I needed to be a leader. I have fond memories of when Marian enabled me to attend a special summer program at Saint Louis University. For five days, I went to classes, lived on a college campus and gained the full college experience!

Marian's Graduate Support Team has been vital in helping me reach my goals. Since I graduated from Marian, the team has stayed in constant contact with me and has helped me navigate high school, college, and even provided general life advice.

Last Spring, Marian's Director of Graduate Support contacted me knowing I was interested in participating in a summer internship. She connected me with Bayer, where I interned at one of the largest companies in the world!

The environment at Marian has contributed to the woman I am today. I have served in many leadership roles — serving as secretary of my high school's National Honor Society, cheer team captain and a volunteer — all while working a part-time job. At Fontbonne University, I have been a residential assistant to 39 other students, served as president of the Black Student Union, and I continue to maintain outstanding grades.

Marian has also provided me with the financial support and knowledge I needed to achieve educational success. Marian paid half of my dual enrollment classes through UMSL and I secured a full ride to Fontbonne!

Marian is a family I truly depend on. We say, *"Once A Marian Girl, Always a Marian Girl."* And it's true! One day, I hope to develop a mentoring program for Marian Girls like me, who may not see their potential or recognize the skills they possess to reach their goals.

Before Marian, I was a young girl who needed guidance. I didn't know I had anything to offer. I didn't love myself or push myself to be better. Marian is a sisterhood that has helped me achieve my greatest potential. I'm excited for my younger sister to one day become a Marian Girl. To me, Marian is more than a middle school; it's a source of inspiration and a support system that is truly *"Educating Girls For Life!"* Thank you!

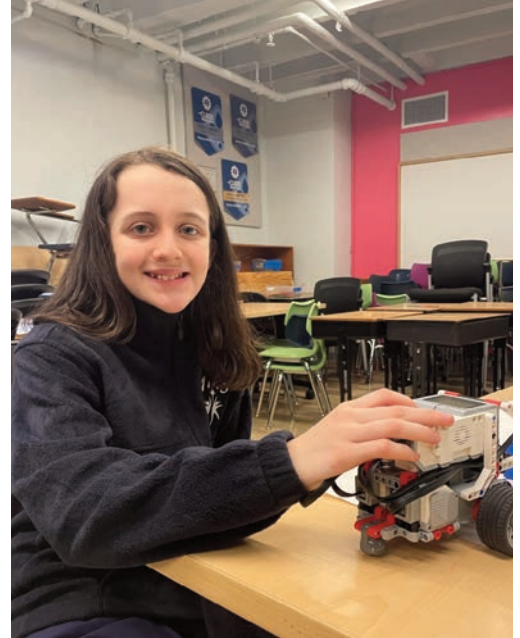
SCIENCE TECHNOLOGY ENGINEERING MATH

Marian prepares students for 21st century careers in STEM through an innovative curriculum that combines multidisciplinary and hands-on learning. Students' fortitude and commitment to discovery enables them to choose advanced STEM classes throughout their high school, college and career journeys, and pursue higher paying careers. STEM programming has been an integral part of Marian's curriculum since 2011.

In any given year, our STEM courses include:

To better prepare students for advanced high school curriculum, Marian provides 8th grade students with Algebra (rather than just pre-Algebra).



Math Meets History



7th graders learned about African American history while creatively developing their STEM skills — using algebraic expressions and graphs. Students were asked to plan a trip beginning in St. Louis and ending at an African American historic site or Historically Black College or University (HBCU). Students used four-quadrant graphs and equations mapping the journey. Students more confidently used positive and negative integers in algebraic expressions and worked with all four quadrants of a coordinate plane.



Faith is nearing the completion of her bachelor's degree in cybersecurity at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. She was selected to be one of 20 students among over 500 applicants to participate in a nationwide Cyber Academy. The six month hands-on program allowed her to gain industry recognized certifications.



Performing Arts Center Welcomes New STEM Classes

As part of Marian's Capital Campaign improvements, Marian completed construction for a new Performing Arts Center, including spaces to provide a variety of STEM programming, including music, theatre, stage design, and enhanced automotive engineering spaces.

Virtual Enrichment Highlights



Culinary Arts Club

6th graders in the Culinary Arts Club enhanced their culinary skills from home. Marian purchased ingredients for recipes and provided food for pick-up. Students built their culinary skills and shared meals with their loved ones.

Self-Discovery Through Art

Marian's Art teacher, Mrs. Sarah Paulsen-Fuller, is an award-winning artist who has been featured widely in local and national exhibitions. She is committed to helping Marian students express themselves through art and art activism. Students learn to translate their experiences, emotions, and identity into artwork, which results in healing and self-empowerment.

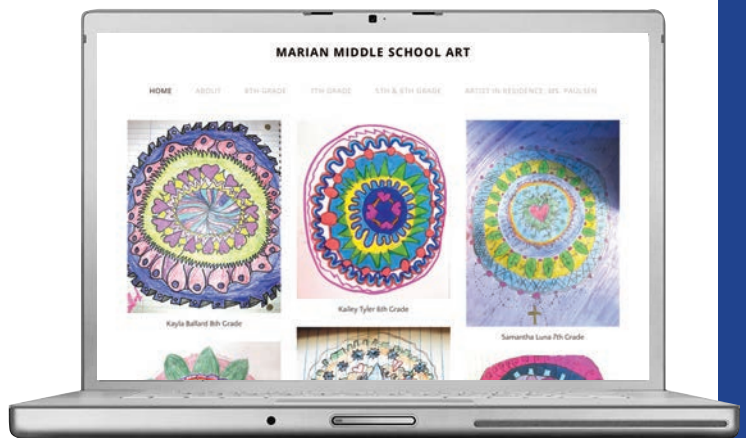


Marian adapted its art program to allow students to more easily make art at home. Marian's 5th and 6th graders, including 5th-grader Charlye, worked on Zentangles, sketching and portrait drawing, collage visionboards, weaving, character design and sculpture, and abstract watercolors.



Eighth Grade Club

Marian also provided a safe space for 8th grade students to have moments of self-discovery and reflection. Through student-led discussion and selection of themes such as sisterhood, mental health awareness, identity, and social justice, students learned how to express themselves through creative writing, music, and more.



Loving Kindness Mandalas

Students learned about mandalas, a traditional object or symbol to aid in meditation, and made their own to guide their practice. Before decorating their mandalas, students extended thoughts and prayers for their loved ones.

GRADUATE SUPPORT PROGRAM

“A Life-Altering Journey!”

Our work does not end when a Marian Girl graduates from 8th grade. When we say “*Educating Girls for Life*,” we mean it!

Developed in 2003, Marian’s Graduate Support Program provides long-term high school, college and career preparedness support for Marian Girls so they can continue their journey of success, and break the cycle of poverty. **It’s one of the leading and most unique programs of its kind in the region.**

The program includes academic, social, and financial support, including:

- One-on-one mentoring
- High school scholarships
- Student and parent workshops
- ACT/SAT prep courses
- Pre-enrollment college visits and continued support
- Summer internships and career exploration
- Counseling support and referrals when crises occur
- College access programs through Saint Louis University, Washington University, University of Missouri-St. Louis, College Bound, and more

During the pandemic, the Graduate Support Team proactively shifted programming to meet the needs of students. This included making virtual visits and phone calls to students, sending care packages, and providing virtual career counseling. Marian continued connecting students to campus resources, internships, and job shadowing opportunities. In a typical year, it’s not unusual to find Marian alum returning to walk the halls at Marian — whether that’s to inspire future graduates, take part in community service, or proudly share their many accomplishments.

◀ **Kayla** is working to secure her doctorate in English from Washington University's PhD program. Her commitment to excellence earned her a full, merit-based scholarship.



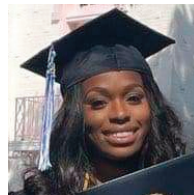
