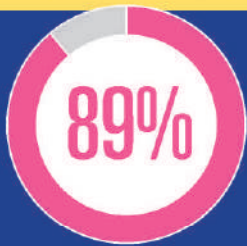

# Scholarships and Awards

## Great Gains:

Marian uses the NWEA standardized test to assess each student's learning potential and customize curriculum to meet her evolving needs.



Harmony excelled in all subjects. She grew faster than 83% of her peers nationally in math, 98% of her peers nationally in reading, and 87% of her peers nationally in science. She came to Marian performing well below grade level and graduated performing on and above grade level. Here's what Harmony had to say:

## FACT:

Marian Girls participate in daily 40-minute periods of choice independent reading time, which helps them build fluency, vocabulary, and content knowledge while also developing a love of books.

## FACT:

**ALL** Marian 8th graders are enrolled in Algebra 1 compared to only **24%** of 8th graders nationally.

Marian donors, grantors, and corporate partners make it possible for Marian to provide education to Marian Girls 10 months a year, 10 hours a day. Although it costs \$24,018 to provide one Marian Girl with education, Marian families are only able to pay an average of \$60/month for their student's tuition. Several donors and partners step up to help fill this gap through specific scholarships!

started at Marian in 5th grade performing in the 59th percentile in Science. As a 7th grader, she performed in the 90th percentile. Phoenix serves as a Student Ambassador, is a member of our award-winning Robotics team, and attended the Washington University Researcher for a Day program.



### Isabella

graduated from Incarnate Word Academy and was offered \$723,000 in scholarships. She also participated in the F.A.R.M Apprenticeship Program, alongside another Marian alum. Through the program, which is sponsored by Bayer and Fresh Harvest 365, Isabella learned about Agriscience and developed ideas for bringing agriculture to urban food deserts. She plans to major in Computer Science at Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville.

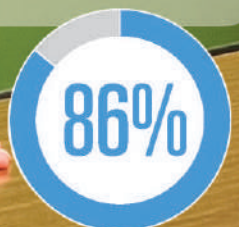

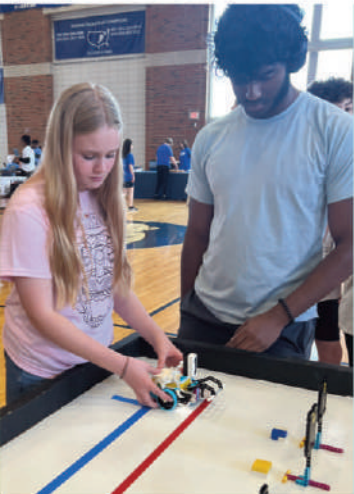

# STEM ACHIEVEMENTS:



Through a partnership with the YMCA, Marian Girls were able to work with the Marine Advanced Technology Education Center (MATE II) to design underwater drones. The curriculum focused on the Engineering Design Process, circuits, buoyancy, fluid mechanics, and safety.

The Links, a social and service organization of prominent Black women, hosted NSBE Jr. (National Society of Black Engineers) at Marian, organized a speed networking event for 8th graders, and gave Marian Girls the opportunity to Zoom with astronaut **Jeannette Epps IN SPACE.**



Marian competed in the Clavius Robotics Jamboree, where they won the Janet Knobbe-Viox Judges Award for the second time and earned ANOTHER platinum banner. Out of 32 schools competing, only 8 received this highest level of achievement. Marian's Tigerbots have been the most decorated team at the event, winning platinum banners in 2018, 2019, 2020, 2022, 2023, and now 2024!

Ten students participated in the "Researcher for a Day" program through Washington University's Engineering Department. The girls toured an engineering research lab, completed an experiment with engineering graduate students, and went on a full campus tour.



Thanks to Marian's incredible partners, Marian Girls experienced a range of STEM field trips, including Solis Agrosience, Bayer, the Challenger Learning Center, and the Missouri School of Dentistry and Oral Health. They also attended STEM camps through Boeing, Missouri S&T, and Missouri 4-H.



# NEW PARTNERSHIPS



Marian entered into a formal partnership with A.T. Still University, providing opportunities for mentorship, scholarships, tutoring, leadership workshops, academic support services, and more.

As part of the partnership, several Marian alum have attended the ATSU-Truman Healthcare Academy, a competitive program limited to only 50 students, where they got to stay on the Truman campus for FREE.

I have always been interested in nursing, so I was excited when Ms. Harris recommended the program! We went to A.T. Still University's Dental School and got to work in simulation labs. I like hands-on activities, so to be able to experience things like that was intriguing for me. It definitely made me interested in the dental field and taught me that there are endless job opportunities and multiple paths you can take to get there.

## New Classes

### ◀ Aeroponics

Taught by our Science teacher, Ms. von der Heyde, this class allows Marian Girls to grow a variety of leafy greens, herbs, and lettuces in their own Aeroponic Tower Garden. Marian Girls have learned about ethical growing methods and have used their harvest to make recipes, such as pickles and salad, to share with the school. Extra produce is shared with the community for FREE through Marian's partnership with Local Harvest, a nearby grocer.

### ◀ Beat Making

This class takes place in Marian's recording studio, which was funded by the *Transforming Lives, Building our Futures* Capital Campaign and allows Marian Girls to mix, record, share, and collaborate on their vocal creations.

### ▶ Forest School

Local mom and owner of Wilderkids, Angela Wildermuth, takes Marian Girls to neighborhood parks to interact with the natural environment, learn about local ecosystems, and gain knowledge of plants, trees, and foraging. During Winter, the girls made tea from pine needles.

### ▶ LitShop

This local program combines engaging literacy opportunities with building. By intentionally creating a supportive space where girls can take risks, explore creatively, build skills, and connect with peers, LitShop fosters leadership and confidence.



## Enrichment Highlights



**Coach Devin**, Marian's volleyball coach, has been instrumental in inspiring Marian Girls' love of volleyball. Although most Marian Girls have never played an organized sport, many of our alumnae were selected for highly competitive high school volleyball teams: S'Naya and Kailey (Cardinal Ritter College Prep), Micayia and Samira (Incarnate Word Academy), Amirra, Kennedy, and Rayne (Rosati-Kain Academy), Nia (North County Christian School), and Skye (Clyde C. Miller Career Academy).

**Nia** discovered her love of theater by participating in Marian's Enrichment classes and performing in Marian's musicals in partnership with STAGES St. Louis. When she began high school, she learned that her school did not offer theater. Leveraging the resourcefulness and leadership she learned at Marian, she and a friend decided to create their own theater club. They co-wrote, directed, and performed a play completely independently.



**Kamillia** was selected to attend the Missouri Thespian Conferences in January 2023. This conference is typically only attended by upper-classmen, but Kamillia was one of very few sophomores that earned the opportunity. Kamillia started her theater and choir journey at Marian in 6th grade, bravely singing a song from *The Greatest Showman* in front of the entire school.

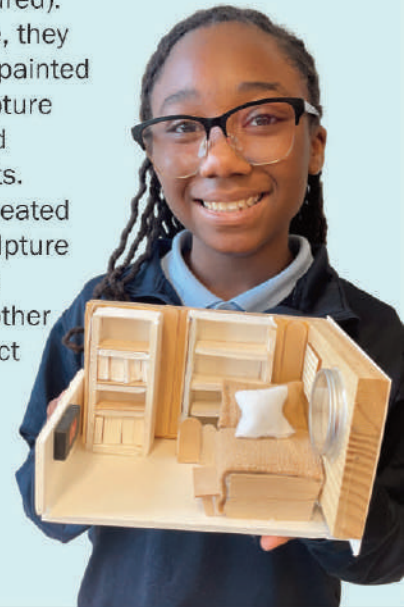

## ART CLASSES

### Sculpture in the Round Project

During this sculpture unit, students built paper forms, including folding, bending, and cutting, to create inventive scenes, such as a roller coaster and Fytiha's dream bedroom (pictured).

Once complete, they then built and painted a second sculpture from found and recycled objects. One student created an all-blue sculpture inspired by the ocean and another built an abstract moon scene.



### Graduation Art

In preparation for a graduation dinner that Marian hosts with 8th grade families, Marian Girls worked on two culminating art projects: an acrylic painting and a graduation cap design. To inspire these projects, the students attended a field trip to the St. Louis Art Museum to view the exhibit "The Culture: Hip Hop and Contemporary Art in the 21st Century." Students discussed and researched the work of a number of artists focused on the idea of identity. Then, they applied a number of painting and multimedia skills to portray their own unique identities.

For Marian Girls, Marian lights a path to freedom from poverty by illuminating hope, success, and opportunity. Marian’s Graduate Support Program is an integral part of this intensive, long-term support. With our dedicated Graduate Support Advisors, Marian addresses the entire college and career access pipeline.

After two decades of supporting Marian alumnae, the Graduate Support Program continues to evolve to help Marian Girls bring their dreams to life. This includes:

- Building formal internship programs with the region’s top organizations to support our alums’ journeys to career success.
- Increasing opportunities for postsecondary, skills-based training programs, such as NPower, based on the recommendations of Fortune 500 companies Google and Apple.
- Expanding our mental health and therapy services to alumnae.
- Developing partnerships that create opportunities and experiences. For example, Marian partnered with Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Inc. on their annual HBCU Bus Tour, in which three Marian alumnae got to immerse themselves at Tennessee State University, Fisk University, Spelman College, Morehouse College, Clark Atlanta University, Florida A&M University, Alabama State University, and Alabama A&M University.

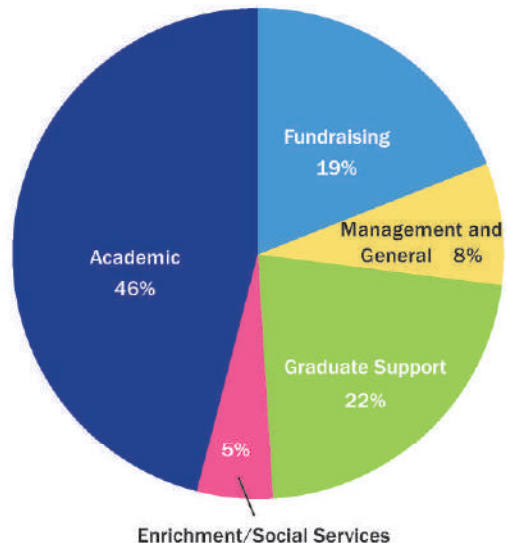

# SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL SUPPORT



U.S. Census Bureau data shows that depression and anxiety have more than tripled since the pandemic began, with people of color disproportionately affected.

To overcome these challenges, **Marian uses a holistic, trauma-informed approach** — employing a three-person Care Team that includes a School Counselor, School-based Licensed Therapist, and a Family Resource Advocate.

**Marian also formed a NEW partnership with the Student Wellness Program.** This innovative program helps Marian screen ALL students for mental health concerns, enabling the team to identify and support students who may have masked their challenges but need help.

**72%** of Marian Girls qualified to receive **FREE** case management through the program

**76%** of those families decided to participate and receive outside support for their student

Marian's Care Team conducted **779 counseling sessions** to support students

**100%** of students were offered support from Marian's Care Team.

Marian's Family Resource Advocate reached out to **100%** of our families quarterly, including 44 home visits. She connected a parent with free, life-saving medication through a partnership with Ascension Rx, garnered legal services for a family living with black mold, supported a family living through the trauma of violence and domestic abuse, and more.

**93%** of students who had 10+ sessions with our Licensed Therapist were able to identify two healthy coping strategies by the end of the year.

**91%** of Marian Girls said they were aware of how they were feeling and what their mental health needs were.
